
A Schlaraffia Owl Bead

castle-like building where they had held their meetings in Jablonec nad Nisou.

When I got back to the USA I tried to learn more about the organisation. Wonder of wonders, there is a US branch headquartered in Denver, Colorado. When I wrote to inquire about it, I received more information about the organisation from Bill Picker. Schlaraffia was founded about 1875 in Prague by the city's artists and intelligentsia who

formed it as a way to make fun of the pompous nobility. The aristocracy would invite artists, poets, actors, singers and scholars to perform at parties and after the performances the artists would get the 'bum's rush' and the nobles would have a real party.

The nobility would bestow medals and confirm the rank of knighthood on each other, so the artists and actors figured they could go around the corner and do the same thing at a local bar. Meetings, which members called 'plays', were full of false pomp that was intended to make fun of the nobles and their pomposity.

Today there are Schlaraffia chapters all over the world and members speak only German at their meetings. The organisation now focuses on friendship, humour and art and is open only to men.

I have never been able to find out for sure if the owl is the symbol of this secret society, but if it is, maybe I can be an honorary member – sounds like fun to me!
